Annual Spring Meeting: Mayors Panel, New Location, Thurs. May 11, 5-9 pm

The Mayors of Berkeley, Albany and Emeryville will speak on "The Future of Housing in the East Bay" from 6:30 to 7:30 pm, Thurs., May 11, at the Annual Spring Meeting. Jesse Arreguin, City of Berkeley, Peggy McQuaid, City of Albany, and Scott Donahue, City of Emeryville, will answer questions from the audience and the moderator, Preston Jordan, LWVBAE Board Member.

It's a new location --the Berkeley Chinese Community Church at 2117 Acton Street, just south of University Avenue, with parking lot and street parking. All are welcome to attend the panel and sign up for the optional buffet supper. All Members are invited to participate in the Annual Business Meeting.

Meet our Mayors: Housing Panel on May 11

Our three Mayoral Speakers on May 11 have richly varied experience on housing and related planning issues.



Jesse Arreguin: Elected as Berkeley's mayor on November 8, 2016, Mayor Arreguin grew up in a working class home. He experienced housing problems early; his family had to move from San Francisco because of

rising housing costs. As a member of many city commissions, including the Housing Advisory Commission, Zoning Adjustments Board, Planning Commission and Rent Stabilization Board, and as a City Council Member, Arreguin helped fund, plan and write legislation to help people stay in their homes, improve city plans and to build additional housing. Arreguin was elected to City Council in 2008 and served until his election as Mayor.



Scott Donohue: After art school in Philadelphia and Los Angeles and a bike trip across country, Mayor Donohue settled in an old warehouse in Emeryville in 1978. He and other artists there started a tenants union

and established the Emeryville Artists
Cooperative, non-profit housing for artists, now
three buildings with 58 studios. After a diagnosis
of bone cancer in 1988, he turned to making
large, permanent public sculptures. Among his
25+ public art pieces are the Berkeley Big People
on either side of the Berkeley bike and pedestrian
bridge over I80. After serving on the Emeryville
bike and pedestrian advisory committee, he ran
for City Council in 2014.

Peggy McQuaid: Mayor McQuaid still lives in the Albany house where she grew up. After graduating from Holy Names University in Oakland in political science, she worked for the Albany Unified School District for

most of her professional career and served as Albany Pool Director for 19 years. In her second year on City Council, she also serves on the Leadership Board of Everyone Home, a coalition of Alameda County agencies and governments dedicated to housing every homeless person, and on the League of California Cities Community Services Policy Committee. Among her many government and volunteer activities, she was a founder of the Diverse Housing Working Group.

League Action Priorities This Spring Local & State: Prop 13 Reform at the Legislature

- The Make It Fair Constitutional Amendment will be reintroduced in late April by State Senators Nancy Skinner and Holly Mitchell. The amendment will propose a reform of the commercial property tax portion of 1978's Proposition 13. This reform would provide more funding for public schools and local government. We expect a rally to be scheduled in Sacramento. Check the website for new information and contact Ruby MacDonald to participate in the rally.
- The LWVBAE Prop 13 Reform/Civics Ed Team will present an educational and entertaining tour-de-force on the origins, unintended consequences and opportunities for Prop 13 reform at a State Convention caucus in Sacramento on Friday, June 2, at 9 pm to educate fellow Leaguers on effective public education and lobbying in support of the Make It Fair Constitutional Amendment. National League Calls to Action on Key Election, Climate and Immigration Issues: Led by President Chris Carson of California, LWVUS has begun to speak up promptly and loudly to protect our priority issues—joining with others at the Women's March and the upcoming Climate March and making frequent public statements. President Carson has called for President Trump to produce evidence of his claims of unlawful voting, opposed the congressional healthcare plan and supported the existing ACC, is leading a campaign for redistricting reform nationwide, and for registering of young people in high schools.

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
