"I JUST CHANGED THE WORLD"

On October 22 and October 30, respectively, 572 Albany High students and 1,303 Berkeley High students joined more than 260,000 students statewide in turning out to vote in California's student mock election, sponsored jointly by the Secretary of State's office and the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. With help from local PTSA parents and from members of our League, Albany High Connect Academy students and teachers, and Berkeley High leadership students put on two well-run elections.

At Albany High, League members *Bill Chapman*, *Jinky Gardner*, *Penelope Hanan-Dahmen*, *Jane Barrett*, *Alice Kisch*, *Marsha Skinner* and *Ellen Logue* served as observers and election information resources alongside Connect Academy teachers and PTSA parents; while students did the work of checking in registered student voters, supervising the ballot box, handing out coveted "I Voted" stickers, and counting the voted ballots. The Presidential results showed an overwhelming 492 students (86.01%) voted for Barack Obama. At Berkeley High, leadership students checked in student voters, PTSA parents monitored students as they moved in and out of the polling booths, and League members *Bill Chapman*, *Cathy Lynch*, *Helene Lecar*, *Sheila Jordan*, *Doris Nassiry*, *Barbara Alesandrini*, *Steve Schwartzberg*, *Janet Strothman*, *Sherry Smith*, *Liz Schaaf*, and *Tom* and *Jane Coulter*, supervised the ballot box, handed out stickers and counted voted ballots. 1,156 Berkeley High students (88.72%) voted for Barack Obama for President. For our next *Voter* (February 2009), *Linda Swift* is planning an article in which she'll compare the student vote with the final local, statewide and national results to see what we can glean from these data.

I think I speak for all League mock election volunteers when I say that student excitement around this election was infectious. Teachers, such as Berkeley High's Hasmig Minassian (in the photo top left), used the opportunity to help students wanting to cast informed ballots; and students left, excited and pleased (many with huge smiles on their faces), at exercising their right to express themselves at the ballot box. Perhaps the moment that most

We HAD AN ELECTION AND NEARLY EVERYBODY CAME!

Our League's Election Services activities started in August, when League members researched the Berkeley and Albany measures, and wrote pros and cons about them. Lessly Wikle Field was in charge of production, and League members, including Mim Hawley, Fran Packard, Jean Safir, Karen Nelson, Lois Brubeck and Phoebe Watts wrote and edited them

The State Library of California produced the Easy Voter Guide, and LWV Bay Area wrote pros and cons for two regional measures. Finally, the State pros and cons arrived – packed with a surprise in the boxes errata sheets which had to be folded and inserted into each flyer. Many people helped with this tedious job: Rose Williams, Cynthia Wooten, Cheryl Nichols and the office volunteers that week did most of the work. All of the above documents – state, local (Berkeley and Albany), regional and Easy Voter Guide – were distributed to libraries, senior centers, places of worship, clubs, neighbors, YMCAs, Berkeley and Albany high schools and city clerks' offices. Helpers were Jean Safir, Wendy Markel, Mim Hawley, Allie Norton, Ginette Polak, Nancy Bickel, Suzanne Chun, Janet Strothman, Bill Chapman, Rose Williams, Jinky Gardner, Sherry Smith, Helene Lecar, Ursula Rolfe, Juanita Peterson and Louetta Erlin.

The League produced a candidates' forum for candidates for Berkeley mayor, Berkeley City Council Districts 2, 4, 5, 6; Berkeley School Board and Berkeley Rent Board. These for a were taped at the Berkeley Community Media studio and at City Council Chambers. Lessly Field was the moderator for the seven programs, which were rebroadcast several times on Channel 33. Besides *Lessly*, League helpers were Masako Yamada, Phoebe Watts, Jill Martinucci, Lois Brubeck and Mary Lou Breiman, and we had excellent assistance from David Jolliffe and the rest of the staff at BCM. We also gave a forum for Albany candidates for City Council and School Board, which was taped and broadcast on Albany's community cable station. Jane Coulter moderated, and Roxanne Soucy, Marsha Skinner, Lois Brubeck, Jean Safir and Sherra Scott (an Albany High school student) helped. We also had a forum for Berkeley School Board candidates at Berkeley Adult School during the day, so students were the audience. Helene Lecar moderated, and Lois Brubeck, Ursula Rolfe and Dan Reamon (a teacher at the school) helped.

Sherry Smith was in charge of the SmartVoter website, which had an unusually high number of visits during the election season.

Eloise Bodine organized a Speakers Bureau. Claudia Berger and a small group distribute voter registration cards to post offices and libraries year-round, and they had an especially busy time for the past few months.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS REPORT SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 2008

New Plans Frame the Presidio's Main Post

Draft plans for The Presidio's Main Post were presented at Environmental Concerns September 8 meeting by Presidio Trust Public Affairs Spokeswoman Jody Sanford.

Many partners have worked on the Presidio's transformation from an historic military post to a national park and National Historic Landmark, making it one of the largest historic preservation projects in the country. More than half of the Presidio's historic buildings have been "rehabilitated." While new construction is rare, a number of projects are now under consideration at the Main Post:

- The Parade Grounds open space where troops conducted drills, ceremonies and exercises, will be transformed from an asphalt parking area to a community green framed with new and renovated buildings. It will be linked by the Anza Esplanade, a new pedestrian "Main Street."
- The Officers Club, considered San Francisco's oldest building, will support a heritage center, an archeology lab and educational program, and a venue for special events.
- El Presidio, established by Spanish colonists in 1776, will be excavated and visitors can experience an active archeological site.
- **Presidio Theatre**, the 1930s-era theatre unused for over a decade, will be rehabilitated and expanded for film and other theatrical performances.
- Montgomery Street Barracks, built in the 1890s, frame the Main Post and will feature visitor-serving activities, restaurants, galleries and cultural institutions, including a private Disney family collection open to the public.
- Contemporary Art Museum, probably the most controversial project, is to be built south of the Main Parade at the site of the bowling alley, and will be a contemporary museum of modern art with an annex of public art programs, workshops and classes.
- Park Lodge, in the tradition of national park lodges, for overnight lodging in an historic building and a new building.
- Main Post Bluff Portions of Doyle Drive, the highway that connects San Francisco to the Golden Gate Bridge, will be placed underground as it passes in front of the Main Post, restoring the Main Post's connection to the waterfront.
- Parking will be relocated to the perimeter of the Main Post with about 2,100 spaces, same as today. MUNI and the PresidioGo Shuttle will be available.

The 1,500-acre Presidio is part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area, established largely through efforts of the late U.S. Rep Phillip Burton (D-CA), which encompasses 59 miles of bay and ocean shoreline from Pt. Reyes to South San Mateo County and includes military fortifications that span centuries of California history. As a result of a congressional act in 1997, The Presidio evolved into a federal/nonprofit partnership, and the Park Service became a twinned management entity with the Presidio Trust, which is mandated to make the Presidio self-sustaining by 2012.

A BIG BATHTUB OF OIL

"Cost, Conflict and Climate: U.S. Challenges in the World Oil Market" was the topic presented to Environmental Concerns on October 13 by Severin Borenstein, Director of the UC Energy Institute (www. ucei.org).

Three distinct yet related challenges that U.S. oil consumption presents are 1) The economic impact of high oil prices; 2) the geopolitical effects of large wealth transfers to some oil-producing countries; and 3) the contribution to global climate change caused by burning oil and its refined products. Although these challenges are often treated as a single issue in policy debate and the media, they are distinct; and addressing any one of these issues can help or hinder the other two.

"There is a single-world oil market," Borenstein said. "There's no such thing as reducing our oil from Saudi Arabia. Every time you use oil it drives up the price. It's irrelevant where we get it. All that matters is supply market and demand.

"Think of oil as in a bathtub. There is no such thing as U.S. oil. It's private companies that have the oil and they sell it at world market rates. It's not their fault that the price is high, they're just going along with the world market."

Borenstein said that the idea that having our own oil in the U.S. will lower the price is a fallacy, although it can help with the balance of trade. We can drill in the Rockies, West Texas, the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) or the U.S. continental shelf, but we need to weigh that against the environmental costs, he said. "The U.S. produces 5 or 6 million barrels of oil a day but consumes about 20 million barrels a day. There isn't enough oil in the U.S. to ever be energy self-sufficient. The reality is, there isn't enough oil to fundamentally change that balance and if we did we're not going to cut ourselves off from the world oil market."

CIVICS EDUCATION ACTION

CARBON OFFSETS

It doesn't matter where on the globe we emit greenhouse gases. And similarly, it doesn't matter where on the globe we absorb greenhouse gases. The net effect is the same. So supporting a project that absorbs greenhouse gases, anywhere in the world, can "offset" your emissions.

But which carbon offset program can I trust? How do I know the "advertised" work is actually done? According to the Environmental Defense Fund, carbon offsets can be relied on when:

- The reductions have been independently measured and verified;
- They meet high-quality criteria (based on sound, credible science); and
- They are part of a comprehensive plan to reduce emissions from a company's operations (not a short-term, nonsustainable savings).

The Environmental Defense Fund has done significant pre-screening to find reliable carbon offsets. Their selection of carbon offsets can be found at http://www.edf.org/page.cfm?tagID=23994. Highlights from their site include:

"Carbonfund.org: Carbonfund.org with dairy farms in California. Manure from 14 farms is collected daily and processed in a closed environment that captures greenhouse gases. In addition, the recovered gases are used to power a nearby groundwater clean-up system.

"AtmosClear Climate Club: AtmosClear works with a landfill in Illinois. Greenhouse gases from the landfill are collected so they do not escape to the atmosphere and are used to generate electricity. In addition, the project reduces odor and the potential for groundwater contamination.

"e-BlueHorizonssM: e-BlueHorizons' projects capture heat-trapping gases from landfills in New England. One project in Massachusetts uses the recovered gases to generate electricity. Another, in New Hampshire, uses the captured gases to treat wastewater from the landfill. A portion of the proceeds is also used to plant trees along the Lower Mississippi River Valley."

Most carbon offsets must be purchased or renewed every year, so if you find something better...change. Although the best idea is to lower your carbon emissions, everything helps.
