

What can we do, and what are the effects of actions? Evaluate the practicality and effectiveness of the many possible means of mitigation, including consequences (intended and unintended) of employing these methods.

Brown Bag Lunch

The Berkeley Police Review Commission (PRC) has stirred controversy throughout the 35 years that have passed since it came into being by way of citizen initiative.

On Tuesday, March 4, 2008, our own *Sherry Smith* – lawyer, former president of our League and current PRC Commissioner – will talk about the current situation in which the PRC finds itself as its policies and procedures are found to clash with California state law.

The Police Review Commission provides a forum in which citizens can bring complaints against police officers in what used to be an open forum. Find out why these proceedings are now secret and what efforts the Commission is making in order to bring the complaints and the PRC findings back out into the open.

The April Brown Bag Lunch will take place on April 1 (no fooling!), and the topic is "Presidential Signing Statements"; our speaker is still to be announced.

Brown Bag Lunch meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month and are open to the public. The Lunches take place at the Albany Public Library, 1247 Marin Avenue in Albany. ELECTIONS 2008

What we've been doing:

One down, two to go. The League's voter service efforts in our first Presidential Primary this February started late, but ended on a high note. The Indian Tribal gaming referenda (Props 94-97) qualified so late that even the Secretary of State's website could not post the final ballot measures until December. Both the official Ballot Pamphlet mailed to all voters and the state League's Pros & Cons went to press before the measures qualified.

The Los Angeles League saved the day with a thorough discussion of every proposition on a DVD, which we watched just after the New Year. By then we had barely a month before Primary Day. Pros & Cons speakers Jane Bergen, Eloise Bodine and Fran Packard addressed every group wishing to host a speaker. Bobby Spike, Merle Fajans, Muffett Graham, Jan Collins and Ursula Rolfe also trained with the LA DVD, but opportunities to present were limited.

Our voter registration efforts focused on Berkeley High; Albany High got their students registered with minimal help from the League. At Berkeley High, Student Activities Director Christopher Young enabled us to set up a table 3 days running during the lunch hour; and with the help of *Rainey Sykes* who found our volunteers, we registered over 40 new young voters! Many thanks to *Merle Fajans*, *Helen Canin*, *Adeline Kahn*, *Jan Collins*, *Penelope Hanan-Dahman*, *Betty Hicks* and *Mary Rose Ryan*.

Our Mock Election at the high schools enabled all students, regardless of age or citizenship status, to express their political preferences. League volunteers Cathy Lynch, Doris Nassiry, Lois Brubeck, Jody Bush, Diane Akers, Steve Schwartzberg, Barbara Lippard, Ellen Logue, Claudia Berger and Bill Chapman helped the 1,432 student voters check in, supervised the ballot box and counted the ballots. Mock election results are available for viewing via a link on the LWVBAE website home page. The linked page also shows how those results compare to students statewide, and to election day results from Alameda County and the State overall.

Meanwhile, Claudia Berger and her sterling delivery team, Merle Fajans, Constance Fraser, Sherry Keyes, Jennifer McDougall, Jean Safir and Bobbie Spike, kept our libraries, post offices and senior centers well stocked with registration affidavits.

The Work Ahead:

Our upcoming general primary (June 3) will require the involvement of even more League members as we present candidates' forums and Pros and Cons on a host of state and local ballot measures in all three of our cities. Election activity will be especially heavy in April and May.

Voter service is at the core of our commitment as League members. We were born in the struggle

to bring women the right to vote, and enlarging the franchise is still an essential part of what we do.

What part in this great work can you play? We will be holding a meeting at the office on Friday morning, March 7, 10-12, to explore all our options for registering voters, running candidates' forums in our cities and sharing information about what's on the ballot and who's running.

New members and those with only an hour or two to spare are especially invited to come, as many preelection jobs come in small, manageable chunks of time. Even if you can't make the March 7 meeting, call Helene Lecar at (510) 549-9719 if you'd like to take part in Election 2008.

East Bay Depot For Creative Reuse

ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS' January 14 meeting featured Allysyn Kiplinger with East Bay Depot for Creative Reuse. Founded in 1979 by two Oakland Public School teachers, the Depot promotes solid waste diversion and resource conservation through the Depot Store and through its arts and environmental education programs. A resource for teachers, artists and social service agencies, the Depot offers arts-and-crafts materials, educational supplies, vintage furniture, home decor, paper goods, fabric and other reused items.

The mission of the East Bay Depot is to divert waste materials from landfills by collecting and redistributing discarded goods as low-cost supplies. The 4,000- square-foot store is open to the public and is frequented by artists, art educators, social services, recreational leaders, parents, students and households, serving over 36,000 customers each year. Curbside pick-ups, in-store donation acceptance and collection of discarded materials from local businesses divert approximately 500 tons from landfills annually.

The educational mission of the Depot is to increase awareness of school children and the general public regarding the "green" benefits of reusing materials. Teachers get a 10 percent discount on materials, and class field trips are encouraged. Examples of creative reuse include sculptures, toys, collages, handmade gifts, seasonal decorations, clothing and costumes, and refurbished furniture. Environmental programs serve 20,000 participants each year. Special Events, a Depot outreach program, brings hands-on creative reuse activities to community fairs, festivals and school functions.

Household goods and humanitarian aid supplies donated to local non-profits and social service agencies serve thousands of households each year. Between 2003 and 2007, according to the Depot, containers filled with coats, blankets, tents and sleeping bags were shipped to Mississippi, Nicaragua, Afghanistan, Pakistan and rural California.

Financial supporters for the Depot have included StopWaste.org, the Central Contra Costa Solid Waste Authority, the Altamont Education Advisory Board, The California Wellness Foundation, the Marguerite Casey Foundation, Waste Management of Alameda County, Allied Waste Services, Pacific Rim Recycling, Wareham Properties and Good Cents for Oakland.

Support the Depot by donating materials, telling friends, family and co-workers about the store, and encouraging businesses to donate their overstock, damaged merchandise or industrial leavings.

BOARD BRIEFS

At its January meeting the Board unanimously approved a motion to co-sponsor a panel discussion on Reproductive Choice and Election '08 with the National Women's Political Caucus. The event took place on February 11 at the University of California, Berkeley's Boalt Hall School of Law.

Luanne Rogers reported on the Immigration Study Consensus, which achieved little consensus because of overly-detailed questions and the generally poor design of the questionnaire. The Board voted unanimously to adopt new language for question 7. The Study results, including our assessment of the study, were forwarded to National by the February 1 deadline.

MINING IN THE SIERRA NEVADA MOUNTAINS: A TOXIC LEGACY

On Monday, March 10, 2008, our Environmental Concerns Committee's featured speaker will be Sierra Fund CEO Elizabeth ("Izzy") Martin, who will give a PowerPoint presentation on the Sierra Fund's Mining Toxic Legacy Initiative. Included in Martin's talk will be a discussion of the impact of toxins in the Bay Area.

The Mining Toxic Legacy Initiative began in 2006 and focuses on the health threat from exposure to toxins still remaining from historic mining activities in the Sierra Nevada. These toxins include arsenic, asbestos, mercury, lead and other heavy metals. While the presence of toxins throughout the Sierra Nevada had been previously documented, until now no research had been undertaken which examines the impact of these toxic materials on human health.

Environmental Concerns welcomes all interested individuals to its monthly meetings, which are held September through May on the second Monday of the month at the home of Horst Bansner, 1340 Arch Street, Berkeley.
