Lunch is \$10 — you can pay at the door or send it in ahead of time, or you can bring your own lunch — drinks are on the house. When you call the office, you can choose the "special interest" table where you want to have lunch, or you can take your pick when you get to the meeting. (Read the President's letter for more information about this.) In either case, please do join us and help get this new year off to a swinging start.

### Letter from the President

Dear fellow Leaguers,

Each one bring one — Let's revive that grand League practice. It works. *Sybil Dinaburg* brought me to League meetings and, dazzled by the knowledge and competence of the Leaguers I met, I became an active member. Think about which one of your friends, your friends' children, your neighbors, or your work colleagues is interested or concerned about local government, about schools, about the fairness of elections, or about any of the other public issues the League works on so energetically.

Sat., September 15, and Sat., October 6, are your opportunities to introduce someone to the League and to your fellow Leaguers. The League is revving up to reach out very widely to the Berkeley, Albany and Emeryville communities. The very best way to reach out is by reaching out your own hand to one other person and bringing him or her along with you.

The September 15 fall general meeting will introduce you and your friend to League plans for the coming year. To improve the League's visibility and impact in the community, the board has agreed to focus on a few key areas. If the membership votes at that meeting to confirm the board's proposal, one of our three key focus areas will be voting practices and systems.

To give us a thorough and early start for the March primary elections, Registrar of Voters Brad Clark will report on his efforts to improve election administration in the county. New computerized voting machines and new opportunities for voting before election day are major elements in his plans. You'll be able to ask him about his response to the reports of the County Grand Jury and the National Commission on Federal Election Reform. Some of you may have the chance to continue the discussion over lunch. We hope to work with Registrar Clark in recruiting more League members to help as poll workers and in other ways at election time.

In discussions over each lunch table, you'll learn what we're planning in key areas of League activity, from campaigning for Instant Runoff Voting in Berkeley to working to close the achievement gap in the Berkeley schools. And, of course, we hope to energize and interest you, so that you will sign on to help make our plans really happen.

The Community Conversation on October 6 will tackle an issue that our local community is no closer to resolving than is the country as a whole. This first Community Conversation will be: Confronting Racism — Finding Common Ground for Building a Stronger Community. As a co-sponsor of the event, LWVBAE will be part of a broad coalition of community organizations. Marissa Saunders, the new chair of our Education Committee, is the driving force behind this effort.

Why are we addressing this issue? Because it is still an important element in the disadvantages and difficulties that African-Americans and Mexican-Americans and many others face. Even in our liberal communities, children of different races and cultural backgrounds still have, on average, widely different test results and widely different school dropout rates, different levels of access to health care and medical insurance — just to mention the most obvious differences. These familiar facts are a disgrace to our local community and our country.

We need to bring people from our whole community together; we need to begin the community conversations that can break down the barriers that still divide us. Please join us in these efforts.

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### Community Conversation — Confronting Racism — Finding Common Ground for Building a Stronger Community

Saturday, October 6, 2001, 10 am to 3 pm City of Franklin Elementary School 1150 Virginia Street, Berkeley

Although Berkeley has worked long and hard at building an equitable community, the job is still unfinished. There is growing recognition of the continued effects of racism on education, health care, housing employment and government policy, and a need to develop possibilities of constructive resolution of these issues.

The goals of this meeting are (1) to advance the understanding of racism and its daily impact on persons in our community and (2) to develop a community strategy for building a stronger and healthier community.

This meeting is called a conversation rather than a forum in order to emphasize its intent to share and profit from each others' experiences and gain a common understanding and a dedication from each participant to work toward a solution of the problem.

Thirty minutes of introductory activities will present the problem through poetry, a skit and some "warm-up" exercises. Next, discussion groups will be formed, each with a facilitator, recorder and timer. Each person will get a packet of readings and resources. The packets will be numbered to enable random groupings into small breakout groups of about 10 each. Name tags will be first names only, to make participants feel comfortable and avoid feeling influenced by another's organization or position.

The seating will be in a circle and everyone will be asked not to sit next to persons they already know. Lunch will be provided, and it will be a working lunch - the time to bring together the findings of the discussion groups, to identify priorities and to devise strategies for attacking the problems identified.

After lunch, we return to the large group and try to develop a group strategy and overall priorities. Each person will be asked to sign a pledge card to work on a specific goal. A date for a follow-up meeting will be chosen, so we can see what progress we've made and what obstacles we've encountered in pursuing our goals.

The LWVBAE is sponsoring this meeting, but a wide array of other community organizations have also signed on as co-sponsors. It is an opportunity for League leadership in an area that we have never taken on, but an opportunity that we must not pass up. It deserves everyone's support and everyone's participation. We hope to see you there.

*Lucie Buchbinder* is Executive Director and one of two founders of the non-profit Bread Project. ## Highlights of LWVBAE Board Meeting of 8/1/01

The first Board meeting for the new officers of the LWVBAE was held on Wednesday, August 1, in the League Office. Full minutes of the meeting are available at the office. What follows is a summary of the major actions taken by the Board:

All agreed to recommend to the full membership at the Fall General Meeting the following change in our "Issues for Emphasis" for the coming year: drop the Berkeley general plan and add voting practices and systems. (See adjacent article.)

It was also unanimously agreed that we would co-sponsor or support "Community Conversation: Confronting Racism - Finding Common Ground for Building a Stronger Community." The Board authorized up to \$500.00 for "seed" money to help pay program costs. Based on the budget to be presented, the Executive Committee is authorized to increase these funds. ### Report on State & National Action

While the energy crisis made this session of the State legislature a crazy one, LWVC did take stands in support of numerous bills, covering many subjects of concern to the League. It urged support of bills on air quality, campaign finance, foster care, child care, and many others.

Many proposed reforms were the victim of budget worries, but most recently LWVC urged the Governor to sign AB 767, which would have overturned the law that bans certain felons convicted of drug use from getting food stamps and Calworks. Without these programs, it is almost impossible for women to get the services they need in order to eventually reunite with their children. Unfortunately, the Governor failed to sign the bill.

In August, LWVC will sort through the bills that were in the hopper and see which ones are to be held over to next year We'll keep you posted.

#### **Election Reform**

If you are wondering what the national League has been doing about Election Reform, check their web site at *<www.lwv.org>*. It has held a symposium on election reform, testified before various Senate committees on election reform, supported reform legislation, and been active in many other ways.

#### **Calls to Action**

When LWVBAE receives "calls to action" from LWVC or LWVUS, your Action V.P responds in the name of the League. I can forward these action calls to interested members who would like to write letters of their own. — Lois Brubeck, Action V.P.

## Community College Study

Last spring, LWVBAE members, together with members of Oakland, Alameda and Piedmont Leagues, interviewed the 7 Peralta Community College District trustees. Here is a summary of what we found out:

Every trustee mentioned adequate funding as the most important improvement that needs to be made. Many pointed out that 11% of Prop. 98 funds is supposed to go to the Community Colleges, but they have not been receiving their full share.

An increase in student enrollment is not seen as a problem. The District can now accommodate 40,000 students and has about 27,000. The new Vista building will give the District even more space for new growth.

Other issues identified: better high school preparation to reduce the number of remedial classes needed at the colleges; remedial courses to be funded at the same rate as fully accredited courses; technical and skilled service training and accreditation at the colleges; and the role of community colleges to prepare students for transfer to four-year institutions.

Shared governance and greater community involvement also need attention, including: better publicity for the district as a whole; better communication with the public and with students; and more listening sessions like those held in summer of 2000. The newly named presidents of all four colleges in the District (Alameda, Laney, Merritt and Vista) can now appoint citizens advisory boards to help oversee major construction projects funded by Measure E.

Watch for more background information in next month's VOTER, as we prepare for **consensus meetings this fall.** 

## **Berkeley Redistricting**

All submittals, including staff analyses and maps, will be available for public review in the City Clerk Department and on the web by Sept. 4. The City Council has scheduled public hearings for Sept. 13 and Sept. 25, and on Oct. 2 will finalize the proposal in the form of an ordinance. This ordinance will be voted on in March, 2002, and the new districts will be effective in November, 2002. All of the relevant documents will be available in the League office. *-Lois Brubeck*, Action V.P.
