X PROP 73 Waiting Period and Parental Notification before Termination of OPPOSE Minor's Pregnancy.

Parents rightfully want to be involved in their teenagers' lives and all parents want what is best for their children. But good family communication can't be imposed by government. Mandatory notification laws may sound good, but in the real world, vulnerable teenagers who can't talk to their parents may resort to unsafe, illegal abortions.

★ PROP 74 Public School Teachers. Waiting Period for Permanent Status. OPPOSE Dismissal.

The League supports fair, rigorous, and effective teacher evaluation and tenure procedures. However, this measure raises questions of due process rights and may limit the use of dismissal for cause. It does nothing to encourage teachers to enter and remain in the profession.

X PROP 75Public Employee Union Dues. Restrictions on Political
Contributions. Employee Consent Requirement.OPPOSE

The League supports fair, even-handed campaign finance reform, but this measure is bad policy. It restricts public employee unions' use of member dues for political activity but has no similar constraint on corporations.

× PROP 76 State Spending and School Funding Limits.

This constitutional amendment changes the state's spending cap, increases the governor's power to make budget cuts, and revises the Proposition 98 minimum guarantees for state support of education. It reduces flexibility to address changing needs and will cause cuts in essential services. School funding will be permanently reduced by \$4 billion per year. Our system of checks and balances will be undermined by giving this and all future governors the power to make cuts unilaterally. This is not budget reform!

X PROP 77 *Redistricting.*

California needs to reform the way legislative and congressional district lines are drawn, but this flawed measure doesn't measure up. The makeup of its redistricting panel and its neglect of communities of interest in drawing plans are bad policy. This proposal calls for an immediate redistricting that would ignore three million new Californians, and it requires a cumbersome, wasteful ratification of every set of plans by the people.

X PROP 78 Discounts on Prescription Drugs.

There are two prescription drug initiatives on this ballot. Drug companies have contributed over \$50 million to support Proposition 78, an inferior program that depends on their voluntary participation.

✓ PROP 79 Prescription Drug Discounts. State-Negotiated Rebates.

Proposition 79 offers deeper drug discounts to nearly twice as many Californians as Proposition 78. It has an enforcement mechanism to hold drug companies accountable for providing discounts.

Because League positions do not cover the issues in *PROP 80, Electric Service Providers. Regulation*, the LWVC is remaining neutral on this initiative. 9/13/2005

LEAGUES AND LEAGUERS AT WORK IN ALAMEDA COUNTY

Elaine Ginnold, Acting Registrar of Voters for Alameda County, has recruited many League members for two new advisory committees on Instant Runoff Voting (IRV) and on Elections.

The Election Advisory Committee, which first met in August, was formed to advise the Registrar's office on election issues from the point of view of County voters. Its initial focus has been voting equipment decisions, in light of two laws that go into effect on January 1, 2006 requiring County action. The Help America Vote Act (HAVA), requires each polling place to have accessible voting equipment so that all voters can vote independently and privately. The current touchscreen equipment used by the County meets this requirement. The second is the State law that requires each touchscreen to have a voter verified paper audit trail printer. No qualifying equipment has yet been certified by the Secretary of State. Certifications are due between September and December 2005.

Ginnold, with approval by the Board of Supervisors, is issuing a new Request for Proposals (RFP) for a single vendor to provide a mix of equipment at each polling place touchscreens with a paper audit trail, and an optical scan system. This would give voters a choice of systems. Vendors who respond to the RFP will have to meet rigorous new contract provisions that should avoid many of the earlier difficulties that the County endured.

Early Advisory Committee meetings have focused on the erosion of public confidence in the accuracy and reliability of our elections. Issues considered include improving the machines and programs, improving the testing by elections officials, use of "open source code", and making all aspects of the election process open and visible, or "transparent."

Registrar Ginnold has worked with the committee to develop a uniform protocol for **IRV elections** within the County. A uniform "road map" adopted by cities that wished to run IRV elections would enable the county to instruct vendors to develop programs, certifiable by the Secretary of State, when any kind of IRV election arises. In that way, if the same road map were adopted by cities within the County that wished to run IRV elections, the Registrar and the vendor would be able to move forward with incorporating IRV elections as part of consolidated elections. At present Berkeley, Oakland and San Leandro permit IRV elections in some cases. The IRV road map is currently being reviewed by the City Attorneys of these three cities, and the County Counsel.

Good local press coverage of efforts by IRV activists, including some Leaguers, could lead Berkeley to use IRV for its Mayoral, Auditor and Council elections in November of 2006. In September, the Berkeley City Council passed member Kriss Worthington's motion to write to the Secretary of State for clarification of what the City will need to do to implement IRV. The Council urged the Registrar and Board of Supervisors to implement IRV and is preparing to adopt an implementation ordinance. Former City Clerk Sherry Kelly, hired to work on implementing IRV, continues to work with the Registrar and connect with potential vendors to overcome barriers to IRV in Berkeley.

Funding Health Services in the County is a continuing League concern. At its August meeting, the Alameda County Council LWV confirmed creation of the ACC Health Committee and nominated two League members, Dr. Ken Ballard and Sal Tedesco, to the Measure A Oversight Committee. The County Leagues strongly supported Measure A in 2004 as a bailout of the heavily indebted County Medical Center, manager of Highland Hospital and other County services, the safety net for those without health insurance.

Grand Jury reports on the Medical Center's progress toward good fiscal and administrative management are very critical after passage of Measure A. The ACC has written several letters to the Board of Supervisors urging improvement.

To support our two expert nominees to the Oversight committee, we named Susan Schroeder, LWV Piedmont representative to ACC, and Dr. *Ursula Rolfe* to the ACC Health Committee. Susan will chair the committee, and both will share observing duties at the Alameda County Medical Center Board.

Board Briefs--September 7, 2005

The Board was asked to support Measure A, a parcel tax to support schools on the Nov. 8 Albany ballot. A vote was put off pending the collection of additional information to answer members' questions. Further research was done and shared in the days following the meeting, and the Board, polled electronically, voted to **support** the measure.

The following motions passed unanimously:

- That the League allocate up to \$300 to print notepaper featuring the Community Luncheon artwork, to be made available for a donation.
- That the Board continue the Sixth Star Circle group of donors, and that a committee be established to formalize its place within the League.
- That the Board write a letter in support of the League of Women Voters of Louisiana's efforts regarding environmental matters in the hurricane area. A letter will also be sent to the California League backing their support of the Louisiana League.
