are encouraged to attend the business meeting at 1 pm, whether or not they reserve a meal or a tour.

Program Director Jessica Powell has organized this refreshing change from our usual Fall Meeting with lunch and optional tours of the expanded UC Botanical Garden. The August date means that we can ride the free "Bot Bus" shuttle from Downtown Berkeley to the Botanical Garden. Lunch will be in Julia Morgan Hall, very close to the Garden entrance.

August 27th Business Meeting Agenda Items

Proportional Representation Study Vote

Should LWVBAE undertake a study comparing proportional election methods to the plurality at large and single-seat ranked choice methods currently used in our three cities?

Scope: This proposed study would compare proportional election methods to the plurality at large and single-seat ranked choice methods currently being used in our three Which method would be better-more representative, more responsive to the will of the people, more fair? It would be limited to: methods useable in our local nonpartisan elections. It would focus on comparing one proportional method, multi-seat ranked choice, with the current methods.

Background: In Berkeley, the Mayor is elected citywide and Berkeley City Council members are elected by district using the single-seat ranked choice method (or "instant runoff voting"). This method ensures that the Mayor is elected by a citywide majority and the member elected in each district wins a majority of votes in that district. The Albany and Emeryville City Councils, all three cities' school boards, and Berkeley's Rent Stabilization Board are elected by plurality at-large. Each voter may vote for the same number of candidates as there are seats to be filled: the candidates that get the most votes win the seats. Neither of these methods ensure that a majority of the body will be elected by a majority of the voters city-wide. Even a large minority of voters may not be able to elect any candidates to the body.

Why should LWVBAE do this study?

We summarize the main points below. Please read the full proposal in the article posted at the top of the webpage at lwvbae.org about the agenda of the August 27 Early Fall Meeting or search for "Vote on." It would fill in a gap in LWVBAE local election positions.

"Choose-Your-Own" Dues Vote

At the Fall meeting on Sunday, August 27th, the LWVBAE Board will ask members to approve the addition of a membership level that would allow members to set their own dues—with a \$20 minimum. Our current membership levels are: regular member (\$75), additional household member (\$40), and student member (\$20). The change will help achieve diversity in our membership and allow members who are unable to afford a regular membership to have a voice and a vote in our League. We will also invite members who can afford to do so to add larger additional contributions when they pay their annual dues—to support our work and our PMP [per member payments] to the other levels of League.

The Board believes that the more than 100 new members who joined for free last year are more likely to continue in the League with this option. It will also help our League sustain itself financially. Members are often unaware that most of the \$75 membership fee—\$61—is sent to the regional, state, and national levels of League to support staff who lobby legislators, educate the public and provide services to local and state Leagues.

- It would enable LWVBAE to comment if one of our cities is sued on the grounds that plurality at large elections do not comply with the CA Voting Rights Act. To date, more than 70 cities and 100 school districts have changed from plurality at-large to district at-large methods due to a suit or threatened suit.


